Public Theater Mobile Unit National

Tell us about yourself. I am an artistic producer, director, performer, and all-around theatrical enthusiast from just outside of New York What is the Public Theater's mission, in your own words? everything that The Public Theater does is the idea that "culture belongs to everyone" and that theater and the arts are an essential part of a healthy civic

> life. What steps can a small theatre take to become "radically inclusive?" To me, "radical inclusivity" is about starting with the audience. It is about going outside of your bubble and asking people in your community what they want and why they don't come to you and then doing everything that

you can to break down any and all of those barriers. We as an industry tend to have a practice of looking inward rather than outward. Once you look outward and lead with curiosity, you tend to get answers. And then, once you get answers, you need to actually respond. That is where I think that small theater companies actually have a lot more latitude than larger ones. Small companies have the freedom to be nimble and to try new ways of doing things in a way that larger companies don't. So, I guess — step one: listen, step two: react, step three: evaluate, step four: listen, step five: repeat. Why did the Mobile Unit National **started?** Mobile Unit National is an expansion of the Mobile Unit, which is how The Public Theater began - with our founder Joseph Papp hauling productions of Shakespeare plays to parks around New York City with sanitation trucks. Today, the Mobile Unit meets audiences where they are {in NYC} staging free performances in community centers, homeless shelters, libraries, prisons, and other community spaces. The idea for the national expansion of the Mobile Unit was in response to a one-night-only performance of SWEAT that the off-Broadway cast did in Reading, PA, the day after the show closed at The Public. After the performance, the conversation was so engaging that it moved our artistic director, Oskar Eustis, to announce (before it was a reality!) that we would be performing this play in more communities in the Rust Belt and the Midwest. This project is The Public Theater's way of stepping outside of our own bubble to be in dialogue with communities outside of New York. And, of course, figuring out how to do that authentically has been the challenge and privilege of my past year and a half! What is vour favorite song from Hamilton? Depends on my mood, but if I have to pick, I'll say "Satisfied."
